Use of a Strengths-Focused Assessment Approach in a Collaborative Education-Based Pediatric Clinic

Lakehead District School Board (LDSB) is in its fifth year of offering a unique collaboration between a local paediatrician and the School Board. This clinic provides urgent comprehensive medical and psychological assessments to LDSB students who have medical, behavioural, developmental or mental health concerns that are impacting their ability to be successful in the school environment. Students have an initial medical consultation with the paediatrician and are also assessed by the board psychologist. There is then a meeting involving the paediatrician, the board psychologist, the superintendent, the principal of special education and school principal and school representatives. Individual concerns and assessments of the student are discussed and a comprehensive strength-based plan for addressing these concerns is developed. Parents or guardians join the collaborative meeting to hear about the plan and give their perspective and insight. The Northern Ontario Academic

Medicine Association (NOAMA) has approved funding for a research project associated with this innovative clinic.

"Is there a role for school board trustees in Indigenous language revitalization and immersion?" Presented by Dr. Paul Cormier, Lakehead University

This presentation will ask a critical question for school board trustees in Ontario: Is there a role for school board trustees in Indigenous language revitalization and immersion? To investigate this question, trustees will be asked to consider their role in governance as trustees and the impact of legislation and policy on the ability for Indigenous groups to address this urgent issue in their communities. Some questions to be considered will be: Does the current approach to language instruction in public school's work? What is the connection between pedagogy and Indigenous language learning? What is the connection between Aki (land), language, and cultural transmission? Why is Indigenous language important? What do we mean by language revitalization? What do we mean by immersion?

The presentation will draw on current research, examples from community based language immersion / revitalization projects, and the work of Keewatinase- The Department of Indigenous Education at Lakehead University in developing community based language teacher training programs.
